
Judicial Opportunities in the Civic Education of Young People

Street Law is a practical law curriculum that engages high school students in learning law important in everyday life. Judges team up with teachers in existing classes and teach weekly classes. Washington/Alaska Youth Court Conference

Youth Courts are an alternative to traditional juvenile justice processes, in which young people sentence their peers for minor infractions of criminal law, truancy violations, traffic law or school rule violations.
